Dear Representatives Fenton, O'Driscoll and Senator Kiffmeyer,

As you work towards a compromise on elections legislation, the organizations representing public school districts, school boards, superintendents and school business officials wish to bring to your attention four issues of importance to effectively and efficiently conduct school district special elections. School districts conduct special elections primarily to fill open school board seats as per statute, and to conduct school facility bond referendums and operating referendums.

- Selecting specific dates for these special elections in February, April, May, August and
 November will bring ease and clarity to available dates rather than the current "blackout"
 provisions. We support this and wish to have both August and June dates rather than just
 moving with the state primary. Six dates spread through the year will allow districts to conduct
 special elections as needed throughout the year.
- 2. SF 514 creates a significant inefficiency for school district by preventing districts from consolidating polling places for special elections and requiring counties to conduct all elections. In a small sample of Regional Center Minnesota school districts, election costs increase a factor of two to six times to use all precinct polling places within a school district. Details are in the table below.

One superintendent was dismayed that special elections would be at the expense of one teacher for a year should the district lose the ability to consolidate polling places.

Another superintendent questioned the need to open all polling places with the significant increase in early voting due to "no excuses" absentee voting.

For these reasons, we ask school districts be allowed to continue to consolidate polling places for special elections.

We also oppose the ballot language changes that were included in the vetoed tax bill and request that you don't include those provisions in any final elections bill.
